

**At the dawn of Christianity: Interdisciplinary
studies**
V Cycle of Conferences

**[En los albores del cristianismo: Estudios
interdisciplinares V Ciclo de conferencias]**

(3 December 2018 – 6 May 2019)

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For five years now, a series of lectures has been held at the Faculty of Philology of the Complutense University of Madrid, which deals with a noteworthy subject such as primitive Christianity. The difference is marked by an interdisciplinary perspective thanks to which the best specialists analyse, from a philological, philosophical and iconographic point of view, the Christian documents of the first centuries with topics as different and as interesting as the Antichrist, the new papyrological discoveries of the text of the Septuagint, the recovery of lost manuscripts, the philological-conceptual study of terms such as "joy, Christian *incubatio*, music, divination, hymns, women, the tenuous limits between Judaism and Christianity, the substrate Semitic keywords for Christianity, the pagan and Christian Sibyls, the iconography of the rivers of paradise, the passage from the historical Jesus to the celestial Christ of Paul of Tarsus, the dress-code of Jesus, the first communities, the intellectual reaction against to Christian advance, Gnosticism, the arch of Constantine as a historical and iconographic palimpsest, Medieval controversies between Jews and Christians, Neoplatonism and mysticism in Byzantium, the body and religious identity, or the use of quantum physics for the interpretation of Byzantine theology of Greek Philology at this university, the initiative emerged as a small seminar, selfless meetings

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of students who were studying the subject of Primitive Christian Literature who wanted to increase their knowledge on the subject beyond the school hours marked by their university. Over time, the interest in these talks among students exceeded the classrooms in which they were given and grew until they could establish a cycle of lectures in which not only students participated but specialists with extensive careers in the study of primitive Christianity. Under the name of *Origins of Christianity in Literature, Art and Philosophy*, from 2014 to 2018, along the first steps of these lectures, scholars as prestigious in this field as Antonio Piñero, Renaud Gagne, Pilar González, Ramón Teja or Armand Puig participated; as well as a large number of Complutense students and other universities that have been able to debut as speakers in front of a very diverse audience. This was, and it is still, one of the main objectives of this cycle of conferences: to alternate senior and junior studies, to unite perspectives before a subject as extensive and studied as Christianity, but about which there is still so much to be said.

After the success of the conferences, their growth and their corresponding publications with Dykinson¹ publishing house, in 2018 the conferences were considered as a training activity for the doctoral programs, formalizing their character of initiation in research for interested students. This quantitative and qualitative leap was the cause of further opening the perspectives from which one can approach the study of primitive Christianity and also, therefore, of the change of name. *At the Dawn of Christianity: Interdisciplinary Studies* reflects both the reality of both this cycle of lectures and the multidisciplinary, useful and necessary to achieve a picture as complete as possible about the origins of Christianity.

With its 56 conferences per year, every Monday between November and May at the Philology Faculty of the Complutense University of Madrid, erudite and passionate people for primitive Christianity come together to learn about this interesting period that led to the birth of a religion as important as Christianity is today. This activity is open to anyone who wants to join, either by attending or actively participating in a conference and this has to be thanked to Dr. Mercedes López Salvá, who takes care that anyone who is interested can have access to this course. There are unique teachers who are

responsible for passing the baton to the students without forgetting the traveling companions. This is the key to the success achieved by Dr. Mercedes López Salvá combining generations, themes, studies and perspectives under the umbrella of primitive Christianity.
